Foreword

<u>Crime in South Dakota</u> is an annual publication based upon Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) statistics. The UCR program is the basis for collecting data on selected crimes by participating agencies throughout South Dakota. Prior to 1990, this data collection effort was handled directly by the FBI with approximately thirty-two agencies reporting in 1989. On January 1, 1990, the Criminal Statistics Analysis Center became the State Clearinghouse for UCR data with 85% of the population being covered. Approximately ninety percent (90%) of the population was covered in 1991 with a total of ninety-six agencies reporting. In 1992, forty-nine Sheriffs' Offices and forty Police Departments submitted reports for a total of eighty-nine agencies covering approximately eighty-eight percent (88%) of the State's population.

On January 1, 1994, the South Dakota Criminal Statistics Analysis Center will begin accepting National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) data from participating agencies. Uniform Crime Reporting data will continue to be collected from agencies in the conversion process. NIBRS data will allow for more complete, accurate, and timely crime statistics. Because of the many benefits of NIBRS, I strongly encourage all agencies to participate in this crime reporting program.

I'd like to take this opportunity to recognize everyone involved with this project for your participation and cooperation. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program is strictly a voluntary program and without your assistance, the following crime data would be unavailable.

INTRODUCTION

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) is a cooperative effort among city, county, and State law enforcement agencies. The State Clearinghouse for UCR provides participating agencies with the necessary supplies required for Uniform Crime Reporting. Reports are completed and forwarded to the State Clearinghouse on a monthly basis. The Clearinghouse then reconciles all reports and submits them to the FBI, where national reports such as <u>Crime in the U.S.</u> are generated.

Certain constraints should be noted in interpreting the collective data for the State. The data included in this publication are based solely on actual figures, not estimated figures, from reports submitted by participating Sheriffs' Offices and Police Departments. These figures cannot be compared to 1991 data because of the difference in the number of reporting agencies, nor can these figures be compared to data released by the FBI, as the FBI estimates for non-reported data.

The population figures included in this publication were obtained from the South Dakota Data Center, University of South Dakota. These figures are currently the most accurate available. The information included in this report was generated by a combination of these population figures and the Uniform Crime Reporting Data collected from the participating agencies.

The statistics were analyzed for a twelve month period beginning January 1, 1992. However, several agencies did not report for an entire twelve month period. The information in this publication will reflect this partial participation. The data included in this report can only be as accurate as the data provided by each reporting agency. These figures are based on data received on or before June 30, 1993.

INDEX CRIMES PER 100,000 POPULATION

One of the most meaningful crime statistics used in Uniform Crime Reporting is the Crime Rate. This rate is the number of offenses per 100,000 inhabitants. This rate can be calculated regardless of the number of inhabitants in a city or county. To compute rates, divide the city's population by 100,000 and divide the number of offenses in each class by that answer. The answer is the number of offenses per 100,000 inhabitants and is your crime rate for that offense.

Example:

Population for jurisdiction - 75,000 Number of burglaries for that jurisdiction - 200

Divide 75,000 by 100,000 = 0.75000 Divide 200 by 0.75000 = 266.67

The Crime Rate for burglary in that jurisdiction is 266.67 per 100,000 inhabitants.

MURDER AND NONNEGLIGENT HOMICIDE

5 Offenses Reported 4 Offenses Cleared 4 Total Persons Arrested

The willful killing of one human being by another. Any death due to injuries received in a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is counted as a Homicide. Suicides, accidental deaths, assaults to murder, traffic fatalities, and attempted murders are not classified as murder and nonnegligent homicide.

 In 1992, there were 5 murders reported. Of these offenses, 80% were cleared.

In 40% of the cases the victim was 20-24 years old. Sixty percent were male, and 80% of the victims were white. A knife was used in three (60%) of the murders.

Three (60%) of the offenders were male and 60% were white. The circumstance in 80% of the murders was a single victim/single offender and there was one unknown offender. The relationships of the victims to the offenders were three (3) aquaintances, one (1) husband, and one (1) unknown offender.

A Supplementary Homicide report is submitted by the participating law enforcement agencies in all murder cases. The report provided pertinent information including the age, sex, and race of the victim and offender(s), and any circumstances which led to the commission of the crime. Beginning January 1, 1988 the requirement for the collection of ethnic origin was discontinued; therefore, the ethnicity of victims and offenders is no longer contained in this report.



The carnal knowledge of a female forcible and against her will. Rapes or attempts acomplished by force or threat of force are classified as forcible regardless of the age of the female victim. In the case that several men attack one female, only on forcible rape is counted. Statutory rape or other sex offenses are not recognized under this category. Sex attacks on males are excluded and classified as assaults or "other sex offenses" depending on the nature of the crime and the extent of injury.

 In 1992, there were 313 rapes reported. Of these offenses 76% were cleared. Seven percent of the total rapes reported were attempted forcible rapes.

Juveniles consisted of 15% of the total arrests made for rape and 34% of the persons arrested were in their 20's. June had the greatest occurrence with 38 rapes reported.

ROBBERY

117 Offenses Reported 58 Offenses Cleared 40 Total Persons Arrested

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear. Robbery involves a theft or larceny but is aggravated by the element of force or threat of force.

 In 1992, 117 robberies were reported. Of these offenses 50% were cleared.

Six bank robberies were reported in 1992 with a total amount stolen of \$8,177. The total amount of property stolen in robberies for 1992 was \$44,133. January had the most property taken at a value of \$13,231 for the month. November had the greatest occurrence of robberies with a total of fifteen. The highest average amount stolen(\$1,363) was from the banks (not including miscellaneous). Other dangerous weapons were used in fifty-two (44%) of the robberies reported in 1992. Supplementary robbery information, such as the location of the robbery, is obtained from the "Property Stolen by Classification" report. Highways, streets, and alleys accounted for 31% of robbery locations with a total of \$6,150 of property being lost and an average stolen of \$171.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

864 Offenses Reported 659 Offenses Cleared 479 Total Persons Arrested

n unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. All assaults by one person upon another with the intent to kill, maim, or inflict severe bodily injury with the use of any dangerous weapon are classified under one of the aggravated assault categories. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used.

 In 1992, there were 864 aggravated assaults reported. Of these offenses 76% were cleared.

The greatest occurrence of aggravated assaults was in October with 102 offenses. Hands, fists, and feet were used in 30% of the aggravated assaults. Nineteen percent of the total arrests for aggravated assault were juveniles.

OTHER ASSAULTS

OTHER ASSAULTS - SIMPLE, NOT AGGRAVATED

All assaults which do not involve the use of a firearm, knife or cutting instrument, or other dangerous weapon and in which there were no serious or aggravated injuries to the victims. Although simple assaults are not within the Crime Index, they are collected under other assaults as a quality control matter and for the purpose of looking at total assault violence.

 In 1992, there were a total of 3,725 other assaults reported. Of these offenses 78% were cleared.

Of the total arrests for other assaults, 19% were juveniles.

BURGLARY

3,733 Offenses Reported 770 Offenses Cleared 726 Total Persons Arrested

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts at these offenses should be counted as burglary.

In 1992, there were 3,733 burglaries reported. Of these 21% were cleared.

August had the greatest occurrence with 374 offenses. Half (50%) of those arrested were juveniles.



Forcible entry was most commonly used in 52% of the burglary offenses. A total value of \$1,962,366 was reported stolen with an average loss of \$526. One-fourth (25%) of the burglaries occurred at a non-residence at night with a total property value stolen of \$566,684.

LARCENY

14,664 Offenses Reported 4,489 Offenses Cleared 4,435 Total Persons Arrested

The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Larceny and theft mean the same thing in Uniform Crime Reporting. Motor vehicle theft is not included and is counted separately because of the great volume of thefts in that particular category. All thefts and attempted thefts are counted.

 In 1992, there were 14,664 larceny offenses reported. Of these offenses 31% were cleared.

August had the greatest occurrence with 1,380 offenses. The total amount reported stolen for larceny offenses was \$4,130,417 with an average loss of \$282 per larceny. Twenty percent (20%) of the total stolen was taken from motor vehicles with an average loss of \$330. The highest number of offenses (2,991) were shoplifting. Property taken from coin-operated machines had the highest average amount stolen of \$600. Over half (51%) of the total larceny arrests were juveniles.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

686 Offenses Reported 271 Offenses Cleared 201 Total Persons Arrested

The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on land surface and not on rails. All automobiles taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned, including a joyride, should be classified in this category.

• In 1992, there were 686 motor vehicle thefts totalling \$2,798,661. Of these offenses 40% were cleared.

July had the greatest occurrence with 73 offenses. Of the total value of property stolen, 31% were locally stolen motor vehicles. Over three-fourths (76%) of the locally stolen motor vehicles were also recovered locally. Juveniles were arrested for 61% of the motor vehicle thefts.

ARSON

115 Offenses Reported 50 Offenses Cleared 58 Total Persons Arrested

Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are to be classified as arsons.

• In 1992, there were 115 arson offenses reported with a total property value loss of \$947,065. Of these offenses 43% were cleared. Seventy-one percent (71%) of those arrested were juveniles.

The greatest occurrence was in the month of July with a total of seventeen offenses. A total of fifty-eight arson arrests were made with almost half (48%) of the persons arrested being 14 years old and under. Sixty-two percent (62%) of all arsons occurred in a structure with single occupancy/residential being the most common (28%) of the structures. The highest total value loss was for other residential structures with a total of \$458,965.

The amount of property stolen in 1992 totalled \$8,965,054. Currency and notes consisted of 12% of the property stolen. Of the six index offenses with a monetary value involved, August had the greatest amount of stolen property with a total of \$927,384.

Of the property stolen, 34% was recovered. January had the greatest recovery rate for 1992 with 39% of the property stolen in that month being recovered. Motor vehicles are the most common property recovered (77%) and currency & notes, etc. had the lowest recovery rate of 7%.

The greatest number of arrests (10%) occurred in August. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program offenses are divided into two groupings, Part I and Part II offenses, and it is as important and essential to maintain uniformity in the data collection of persons arrested as it is in the offense data collection conducted for Part I crimes only. The Part II offenses encompass all other crime classifications outside those defined as Part I offenses. The Part I offenses include: Criminal Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. Arrests for Part I offenses total 6,075. Larceny had the greatest total arrest rate (11%) for Part I offenses. Of the total arrests in the Part II offenses, 21% were made for liquor laws. Only 2% of the total arrests made in 1992 were drug abuse related.

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS ASSAULTED


82 Total Officers Assaulted 95% Cleared

In 1992, there were eighty-two (82) assaults on law enforcement officers reported. Of those assaulted, there were over one-third (39%) that received injuries. Ninety-five percent of the total assaults reported were cleared.

Disturbance calls (family quarrels, etc.) had the greatest occurrence (34%) in the type of activity involved with the assault of a law enforcement officer. Most assaults (22%) occurred between the hours of 12:01 am - 2:00 am. The most common type of assignment consisted of a one officer vehicle that was assisted. Over half (63%) of the assaults happened with this circumstance. Hands, fists, and feet are most commonly used (75%) in the assaults that result in an injury. The same was true in 94% of the cases where there was no injury involved in the assault.

DEFINITIONS

Part I Offenses

Criminal Homicide

- Murder and Nonnegligent Homicide The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. Any death due to injuries received in a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is counted as a homicide. Not included in this category are suicides, accidental deaths, assault to murder, traffic fatalities, and attempted murders.
- Manslaughter by Negligence The killing of another person through gross negligence. Not included in this category are deaths of persons due to their own negligence; accidental deaths not resulting from gross negligence; and traffic fatalities.

Forcible Rape

- Rape by Force The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Sex attacks on males are excluded and should be classified as assaults or "other sex offenses".
- Attempted Forcible Rape All assaults and attempts to rape.

Robbery

 The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Firearm - Operation in which any firearm is used as a weapon or employed as a means of force to threaten the victim or put the victim in fear.

Knife or Cutting Instrument - Operation in which a knife, broken bottle, razor, ice pick, or other cutting or stabbing instrument is employed as a weapon or as a means of force to threaten the victim or put the victim in fear.

Other Dangerous Weapon - Operation in which a club, acid, explosive, brass knuckles, or other dangerous weapon is employed or its use is threatened.

Strong-arm - Hands, Fists, Feet, etc - Muggings and similar offenses where no weapon is used, but strong-arm tactics (limited to the use of personal weapons such as hands, arms, feet, fists, teeth, etc.) are employed or their use is threatened to deprive the victim of possessions.

Assault

Firearm - All assaults with revolvers, automatic pistols, shotguns, zip guns, rifles, etc.

Knife or Cutting Instrument - Number of assaults wherein weapons such as knives, razors, hatchets, axes, cleavers, scissors, glass, broken bottles, ice picks, etc. are used as cutting or stabbing objects or their use is threatened.

Other Dangerous Weapon - Assaults resulting from the use or threatened use of any object as a weapon which does or could result in serious injury. The weapons in this category would include but not be limited to clubs, bricks, jack handles, tire irons, bottles, or other blunt instruments used to club or beat victims.

Aggravated Injury - The attacks by use of personal weapons such as hands, fists, feet, etc. which result in serious or aggravated injury.

Simple, Not Aggravated - All assaults which do not involve the use of a firearm, knife, cutting instrument, or other dangerous weapon and in which there were no serious or aggravated injuries to the victims.

Burglary

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.

Forcible Entry - All offenses where force of any kind is used to unlawfully enter a structure for the purpose of committing a theft or felony.

Unlawful Entry; No Force - These situations involve no force and are achieved by use of an unlocked door or window.

Attempted Forcible Entry - Situations where a forcible entry burglary is attempted.

Larceny

• The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, thefts from motor vehicles (except theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories), motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycles, from buildings, and from coin-operated machines. Embezzlement, frauds or bad check cases are excluded.

Motor Vehicle Theft

• The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

Autos - The thefts of all sedans, stationwagons, coupes, convertibles, and other similar motor vehicles which serve the primary purpose of transporting people from one place to another.

Trucks and Buses - Vehicles specifically designed to transport people on a commercial basis and to transport cargo.

Other Vehicles - All other motor vehicles such as snowmobiles, motorcycles, motor scooters, trailbikes, mopeds, golf carts, etc.

Arson

 Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property or another, etc. Incidents in which persons are killed as a direct result of arson are classified as both criminal homicides and arsons.

Part II Offenses

Other Assaults

 Assaults and attempted assaults where no weapon was used or which did not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim are included as other assaults.

Forgery and Counterfeiting

 The making, altering, uttering, or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true. Includes:

Altering or forging public and other records;

Making, altering, forging, or counterfeiting bills, notes, drafts, tickets, checks, credit cards, etc.; Forging wills, deeds, notes, bonds, seals, trademarks, etc.;

Counterfeiting coins, plates, banknotes, checks, etc.;

Possessing or uttering forged or counterfeited instruments;

Erasures;

Signing the name of another or fictitious person with intent to defraud;

Using forged labels;

Possession, manufacture, etc., of counterfeiting apparatus;

Selling goods with altered, forged, or counterfeited trademarks; and

All attempts to commit the above.

Fraud

Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks, confidence games, leaving full-service gas station without paying attendant, unauthorized withdrawal of money from an automatic teller machine, and attempts to commit any of the above.

Embezzlement

 Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody, or control.

Stolen Property - Buying, Receiving, Possessing

 Buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

Vandalism

 The willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law.

Weapons

Carrying, Possessing, etc.: The violation of weapon laws such as:

Manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; Carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; Using, manufacturing, etc., silencers; Furnishing deadly weapons to minors; Aliens possessing deadly weapons; and All attempts to commit the above.

Prostitution and Commercialized Vice

• Includes sex offenses such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, disorderly house, or house of ill fame, pandering, procuring, transporting, or detaining women for immoral purposes, etc; All attempts to commit any of the above.

Sex Offenses

 Includes offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like, such as:

Adultery and fornication;
Buggery;
Incest;
Indecent exposure;
Indecent liberties;Seduction;
Sodomy or crime against nature;
Statutory rape (no force); and
All attempts to commit any of the above.

Drug Abuse Violations

 All arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.

Sale/Manufacturing

Opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine)
Marijuana
Synthetic narcotics - manufactured narcotics which can
cause true drug addiction (demerol, methadones)
Dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine)

Possession

Opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine)
Marijuana
Synthetic narcotics - manufactured narcotics which can
cause true drug addiction (demerol, methadones)
Dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine)

Gambling

 All charges which relate to promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling are included in this category. To provide a more refined collection of gambling arrests, the following breakdown should be furnished:

Bookmaking (horse and sport book) Numbers and lottery All other

Offenses Against the Family and Children

 All charges of nonsupport and neglect or abuse of family and children, such as:

Desertion, abandonment, or nonsupport of spouse or child; Neglect or abuse of spouse or child (if injury is serious, score as aggravated assault); Nonpayment of alimony; and All attempts to commit any of the above.

Driving Under the Influence

 The driving or operating of any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics. These include operating a motor vehicle while under the influence and operating an engine, train, streetcar, boat, etc., while under the influence.

Liquor Laws

 With the exception of "drunkenness" and "driving under the influence", liquor law violations, state or local, are placed in this class. Include:

Manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing, etc. intoxicating liquor; Maintaining unlawful drinking places; Bootlegging; Operating still; Furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; Using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; Drinking on train or public conveyance; and All attempts to commit any of the above.

Drunkenness

 All offenses of drunkenness or intoxication, with the exception of "driving under the influence".

Drunkenness;
Drunk and disorderly;
Common or habitual drunkard; and
Intoxication

Disorderly Conduct

• Committing a breach of the peace. Include:

Affray;

Unlawful assembly;

Disturbing the peace;

Disturbing meetings;

Disorderly conduct in state institutions, at court, at fairs, on trains or public conveyances, etc.;

Blasphemy, profanity, and obscene language;

Desecrating the flag;

Refusing to assist an officer; and

All attempts to commit any of the above.

Vagrancy

 Persons prosecuted on the charge of being a "suspicious character or person, etc." include:

Vagrancy;

Begging;

Loitering (persons 18 and over); and

Vagabondage.

All Other Offenses

Include in this class every other state or local offense (except traffic violations) not included in offenses 1 through 25, such as:

Admitting minors to improper places;

Abduction and compelling to marry;

Bigamy and polygamy;

Blackmail and extortion;

Bribery;

Combination in restrain of trade; trusts, monopolies;

Contempt of court;

Criminal anarchism;

Discrimination, unfair competition;

Kidnapping;

Marriage within prohibited degrees;

Offenses contributing to juvenile delinquency (except as provided for in offenses 1 to 25), such as employment of children in immoral vocations or practices, admitting minors to improper places, etc.;

Perjury and subornation of perjury;

Possession, repair, manufacture, etc. of burglar's tools;

Possession of drug paraphernalia;

Possession or sale of obscene literature, pictures, etc.;

Public nuisances:

Riot and rout;

Trespass;

Unlawfully bringing weapons into prisons or hospitals;

Unlawfully bringing drugs or liquor into state prisons, hospitals, etc.; furnishing to convicts;

Unlawful disinternment of the dead and violation of sepulture;

Unlawful use, possession, etc. of explosives;

Violations of state regulatory laws and municipal ordinances (this does not include those offenses or regulations which belong in the above classes);

Violation of quarantine;

All offenses not otherwise classified; and

All attempts to commit any of the above.

Suspicion

Arrests where persons arrested are released by the police.

Curfew and Loitering Laws (Juveniles)

All violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such laws exist.

Runaways (Juveniles)

 Apprehensions for protective custody as defined by local statute. Do not include protective custody actions with respect to runaways taken for other jurisdictions.

Juvenile Arrests

- For purposes of Uniform Crime Reporting, a juvenile should be counted as "arrested" when the circumstances are such that if he or she were an adult, an arrest would be tallied. Arrests should not be scored in cases of:
- 1. police "contacts" with juveniles where no offense was committed;
- 2. juveniles taken into custody for their own protection but no crime was committed (e.g., neglect cases).

Hierarchy Rule

 Locate the offense that is highest on the Part I offense list, score that offense, and ignore the other offenses involved in the incident. Counting only the highest offense on the list and ignoring all others, applies only to crime reporting and does not affect the number of charges for which the defendant may be prosecuted in the courts. An exception to the rule is arson.

Unfounded Complaints

• A complaint which is determined through investigation to be false or baseless. If the investigation shows that no offense occurred nor was attempted, the reported offense can be unfounded for Uniform Crime Reporting purposes. The findings of a coroner, court, jury, or prosecutor do not unfound offenses or attempts which law enforcement investigations establish to be legitimate.

Clearances by Arrest

- An offense is "cleared by arrest" or solved for crime reporting purposes when at least one person is:
- 1. arrested:
- 2. charged with the commission of the offense; and
- 3. turned over to the court for prosecution (whether following arrest, court summons, or police notice). Although no physical arrest is made, a clearance by arrest can be claimed when the offender is a person under 18 years of age and is cited to appear in juvenile court or before other juvenile authorities.

Several crimes may be cleared by the arrest of one person, or the arrest of many persons may clear only one crime.

Exceptional Clearances

- If the following questions can all be answered "yes," the offense can then be cleared "exceptionally" for crime reporting purposes:
- 1. Has the investigation definitely established the identity of the offender?
- 2. Is there enough information to support an arrest, charge, and turning over to the court for prosecution?
- 3. Is the exact location of the offender known so that the subject could be taken into custody now?
- 4. Is there some reason outside law enforcement control that precludes arresting, charging, and prosecuting the offender?
